Sue's work as an educator has influenced many generations of young people, especially the women of Siena College as reflected on in this publication by two of the young women who she taught. We thank Sue for all she has done for the Siena community.

Year 12 Gift to the Colleg

Sue Fabian is the inaugural Chair of Dominican Education Australia which was launched in August 2015. Sue will retire from the role of Chair at the end of the year, having lead the many legal and governance changes that accompanied the formation of this new body. We thank Sue for her support of Siena College over the past three years and for her encouragement and affirmation of the work of the College Board and Committees. We wish her a well earned retirement from the enormous responsibilities that accompany this role.

Alumna, Susan Alberti AC (Class of 1964), was named the 2018 Victorian of the Year, a fitting tribute for someone whose generosity and contribution has enhanced the lives of many in the wider community. Susan's vision and drive has underpinned many gains for women in the fields of sport and medical research. Well known for her role in the launch of the AFLW, Susan's support for sport recently lead to her investment in 'The Susan Alberti Women in Sport Chair' with Victoria University's Professor Clare Hanlon taking up the inaugural position. No doubt the research and work of this department will continue to advance the profile and opportunities for women in the future.

From the Principal

I am grateful to the College Board for supporting periods of enrichment leave during my time at Siena. In September this year, I was privileged to participate in an immersion program to South America. The program was called Cross and Resurrection and throughout my travels in El Salvador, Bolivia, Peru and Chile, there were confronting, moving and inspirational encounters with both the cross and the resurrection. It was a most privileged experience. I felt I walked on 'Holy Ground' in many places, including the Church where Archbishop Óscar Romero was assassinated in 1980 and his simple home in San Salvador. Archbishop Romero was canonised on 14 October this year but it was obvious that the people of El Salvador had proclaimed him a saint a long time ago.

I came across Dominicans in the places I visited and heard again the stories of Antonio de Montesinos who preached against slavery and servitude in the 16th century and Bartolomé de las Casas who in 1515, gave up his Indian slaves and advocated on behalf of the indigenous people. Las Casas later entered the Dominican Order and became a friar.

I lit candles and prayed for the Siena community at the shrine of Rose of Lima, a third order Dominican who is the Patron Saint of South America, and I visited remote missions in Bolivia with beautiful indigenous artwork gracing the walls of adobe churches, combining elements of 18th century European and indigenous Indian architecture and decorative styles. The earthy ochres, oranges and yellow colours of the painting on the walls and façades glowed in the gentle light of these churches. I encountered the Holy Spirit in the faith of the people and in a small string ensemble of local children aged twelve to fifteen in a Mission called Santa Ana. These children came from simple adobe homes in a village of no more than a few hundred people. They played Vivaldi and Mozart and Bolivian sonatas on cellos and violins in a church built by the indigenous people after the Jesuits were expelled in 1767. I have been left with more questions than answers, abiding memories of an unforgettable experience and new conviction that it is in our deepest humanity and in 'walking with' the poor and the marginalised that we encounter the Divine.

We were much saddened at the recent passing of Susan Law, former Director of Marketing and Communications and member of the College Leadership Team from 2012 to 2017. Sue left a significant legacy in the branding and marketing of Siena College, from cinema ads to the alumnae profiles in the local newspapers, the new student uniform that was launched in 2014, the design of the Strategic Plan, many editions of the Yearbook and most recently, the new wayfinding signage to name just a few. Sue lived every moment to the full and reminded us all to make every moment count.

As the school year draws to a close, we look back with pride and satisfaction on the past year for the learning, the friendships shared and strengthened, accomplishments and service. May Christmas be a time of joy and peace and the New Year full of blessings and promise.



Development at Siena College

Capital Works 2019

We have many exciting projects planned for completion in 2019, beginning with the much awaited refurbishment of the Convent. This project, due for completion by the end of January, will see a new Reception area, meeting room and offices on the ground floor and a new Board/Conference room and Heritage Centre on Level 1. There will be a pedestrian entry to the College from Riversdale Road, aligned with the front doors of the Convent and Reception area, landscaping of the front gardens and road widening works for vehicle entry to the College.

Our continuing signage upgrade will include a prominent monument sign on the corner of Riversdale and Wattle Valley Roads, new wayfinding signage at Main Reception and at the rear Hocknell Street gates.


Some sections of the Waratah lockers will be replaced and upgraded to newer styles and there will be new benches and stools in the Art area that provide more practical workspaces. We are also updating iMacs in the Art area.

We will be installing evaporative air conditioning in the Gymnasium, providing more comfortable amenities for school exams, assemblies, functions and sports classes. We will be also installing air conditioning units in two more of the classrooms in the F block, with only two remaining to be upgraded.









One of our most exciting upgrades is the provision of a new pipeline connection into the school that will improve speed and reliability for internet provision. This is through the AARNet (Australia's Academic and Research Network) group.

We are also installing new WiFi infrastructure throughout the College and upgrading other vital ICT infrastructure. We are adding two additional copier/printers to our fleet and upgrading another older device.

These enhancements will provide much faster and reliable network capabilities, with great benefits to teaching and learning.

These projects are funded through our Capital expenditure budget allocations and from the generous fundraising of the Siena Parents' Association (SPA).

Learning and Teaching

Enhancing Staff Professional Practices

Siena College is committed to optimising student learning in the context of a professional, learning centred school. We recognise that a learning environment must be open to growth and change and engage in reflection, collaboration and innovation. Much has been done and continues to be done to promote learning and the 2018 implementation of the Siena Learning Framework has led the way forward. This year, we have also introduced a new major initiative of committing an hour of staff Professional Practice Time (PPT) every Tuesday afternoon. Our major focus has been on enhancing teaching staff knowledge in regards to best learning and wellbeing practices. The PPT sessions have provided valuable opportunities for staff to work together and share their knowledge.

Leaders of Pedagogy

In 2018 we created two new positions in Leaders of Pedagogy to further support and promote our learning focus, particularly the 'how' of teaching. We were delighted that both positions were filled internally by Siena College teachers with great expertise and experience in their respective faculties. Donna Laughlin, previous Head of English, and Rosanna Merriweather, a former Head of Science have combined well to work with and support Siena College staff this year.

Leaders of Pedagogy foster a culture committed to continuous improvement within subject teams and individual staff to enhance the learning and teaching program. To that end, the Leaders of Pedagogy work focuses on five areas:

- 1. Promoting and supporting pedagogical practice
- 2. Supporting Action Research teams
- 3. Promoting professional dialogue
- 4. Promoting and enabling the use of data to inform practice
- 5. Promoting and supporting the use of ICT

Throughout the year, the Leaders of Pedagogy have worked with a number of teaching teams at a variety of levels: whole faculty, cross faculty Action Research teams, subject based and individual staff. They have worked to promote the sharing of best practice and a greater focus on student centred activities and skill development. During the course of the year, student and staff surveys were utilised to provide a snapshot of current pedagogical practices. The Leaders of Pedagogy, together with members of staff teams, will analyse this data to assist with forward planning.

Action Research

The third initiative to support teaching staff professional learning has been the introduction of Action Research teams to investigate the ten instructional practices that reliably increase student learning, commonly referred to as the 'High Impact Teaching Strategies' (HITS). The purpose of this approach is to provide opportunity for staff to work collaboratively across faculties to trial, analyse, evaluate and finally to make recommendations regarding our pedagogical direction and subsequent future teaching practice.

During Term 4, the nineteen staff HITS teams presented their collaborative research and findings to the entire teaching cohort in five Professional Practice sessions. Each group prepared a report, a learning display and a PowerPoint presentation focusing on their key recommendations for further embedding and promoting these teaching strategies into our classroom practice in 2019 and beyond.

These sessions have been a wonderful opportunity for staff to reflect on the learning that has taken place in Action Research in 2018. The team presentations have been lively, thought provoking and stimulated rich discussion around the important tasks of learning and teaching in the classroom to maximise each student's academic success at Siena College.

Night of Change

Siena's friendship with the women of Kopanang was strengthened when twelve of our students and three members of staff travelled to South Africa earlier in the year. As always, this immersion proved to be a life affirming and life changing experience for all involved. Living with the women of Kopanang enables us to deepen our understanding of the 'other', while at the same time enabling us to recognise the threads in all of our lives which connect us. Siena's ongoing commitment to supporting the Kopanang community was evident in September when the Student Representative Council (SRC) hosted the annual Night of Change, in the College Gymnasium.

Students, their parents and members of staff joined together for a night of live music performances from some of our Siena musicians, disco bingo, trivia and silent auctions with all money raised on the night going directly to the Kopanang Community Trust. The Siena Spirit was indeed evident with many of our families generously donating items for auction. It was also affirming to receive support from local businesses in the form of donations. Students from the 2018 immersion honoured their South African families through written tributes which formed table centre pieces. In total, the night raised just over \$5,500.















St Mary's House of Welcome

As Term 4 comes to an end, the students are preparing to once again support St Mary's House of Welcome. Each year, House Groups are assigned families and students work together to prepare a Christmas hamper for their family. It is a beautiful College tradition which brings us together as a community, helping us to focus on the needs of others within our city and reinvigorates our Christmas spirit.

Gifts donated by the students are distributed to families in need by St Mary's House of Welcome when they gather together at the Fitzroy Town Hall for their annual Christmas celebration.

It is wonderful to see the students' creativity and skills flourishing having chosen to pursue the electives on offer in The Arts and Technology faculty.



'I really would like to be an astronaut!' beams Jade Devlin as she chats animatedly about her upcoming trip to the NASA Space Camp in Houston. The ten day camp will be followed by a much anticipated family holiday taking in the sights of New York and the iconic Californian coastline. Jade hopes to study Physics at The University of Melbourne or Astrophysics at Monash University so the NASA opportunity will provide much inspiration as she commences her final year of secondary school.

Jade is studying Specialist Mathematics, Mathematical Methods, Literature, Chemistry and Physics and has already completed Biology as an Accelerated Subject. She is an accomplished debater and public speaker, having won the Antonio de Montesinos Award this year and is an integral member of the Senior Stage Band and Wind Orchestra. Jade feels that being involved in these ensembles has given her valuable skills beyond the rehearsal room, such as time management and knowing how to block out all distractions to focus on the most pressing task at hand.

Jade was born and raised in Singapore and attended a local school in Bukit Timah, completing exams from the age of seven and enjoying compulsory Science classes, perhaps igniting her passion for that field. Of that time in her life, she comments,

'... as someone who grew up in South East Asia and witnessed absolute poverty in India, I see that people at Siena understand what is going on in these places... we are taught to really value our position in society and use that to make an impact.'

Jade was a Cassia House Captain from Years 9 to 11 and has been involved with the Student Representative Council (SRC) since Year 8. She notes with pride that the Class of 2019 are a very cohesive group. 'Everyone seems to understand each other... the girls have enough goodwill to move past any differences, it's absolutely amazing.' She recalls the 2014 College Captains Isabella Overmars and Kristen Monteiro, who were the Captains when she was in Year 7, as being extremely approachable and hopes to be someone that the younger students can also chat to without hesitation. Jade feels that she and Charlotte make a formidable duo. 'Although we have different interests I feel we can understand each other and we can relate to each other really well... I feel like we are approachable and that anyone from any year level is happy to talk to us.'

Charlotte remembers vividly the energy and passion of the 2014 College Captains as they addressed the wide eyed group of Year 7 students gathered in the gym on their first day. 'They were standing on the stage welcoming everybody and I really wanted to be like them, they were so proud of their school', she recalls with a smile. Her advice to the Class of 2019? 'Give everything a go because the more areas you dip into, the more chances there are to meet new people.'

Charlotte attended Our Lady of Good Counsel primary school in Deepdene and is the first in her family to attend Siena College. Her favourite subjects are Science and Sport and she hope to combine these two passions by enrolling in a Sports Science degree, preferably at Monash University. Her VCE subjects are Mathematical Methods, Chemistry, Italian, Physical Education and English. Charlotte has also already completed Biology as an Accelerated Subject.

Farewell to Sue Thompson

'I believe that schools can play a very important part in a person's life... schools can provide a safe, predictable, nurturing environment... they can be a haven for people.'



From her first teaching appointment at Doveton North Technical School, notably the only female member of the teaching staff, to her current role as Deputy Principal Wellbeing, Sue Thompson has always believed that student wellbeing underpins all teaching and that looking at the person, not just their behaviour, is vital. She reflects on the valuable lessons learnt from her first Principal at Doveton North, which still resonate today. 'He did all sorts of things in the 1970s which are now the model of how a school should run... he was light years ahead of his time.'

Sue attended Our Lady of Sion College in Warragul (now Marist Sion) and, with her parents supporting her thirst for a tertiary education, she decided on teaching. She completed her Bachelor of Arts, majoring in History, Politics and English, followed by a Diploma of Education at Monash University. Sue's first role at Doveton North was followed by an extended period back in Gippsland, teaching at Warragul Technical School and switching to contract work at government and Catholic schools in the region as she and husband Geoff raised the first two of their four children, while simultaneously running a sixty cow dairy farm. They remained in Warragul until 1979, when they moved to a dairy farm in southern NSW, completing their family of four. With secondary education looming for their eldest and conscious of the limited options available in the country, they returned to Melbourne in 1984.

Sue commenced at Siena College in April 1985, teaching Politics, Legal Studies and History and was appointed Head of Humanities the following year. Former students recall her obvious love of history, and as Sue herself explains, 'In order to understand who you are and how you

understand the world you've got to study history... it has everything.' History also permeates her recreational pursuits; one of the things she enjoys most is reading historical fiction.

Sue changed career direction moving from Faculty Head to the Wellbeing area in 2004, via several senior roles including Student Leadership and Senior Kurrajong House Coordinator. Around the same time, she completed her Graduate Diploma in Student Wellbeing and later her Masters at The University of Melbourne. In 2007, following a restructure of the pastoral care system, Sue was appointed Acting Deputy Principal Wellbeing. It was no surprise that she successfully reapplied for the role in 2008. In the ensuing years, Sue has steadfastly promoted restorative practices at the College, maintaining her unshakeable conviction that student wellbeing underpins every aspect of school life.

Sue is very much looking forward to enjoying more time with her extended family, particularly her seven (soon to be eight) grandchildren, and the flexibility to write, read or play music as the mood takes her. She and husband Geoff will work together in his business and enjoy extended weekends at their coastal retreat.

We thank Sue for her extraordinary contribution to Siena College and her legacy of exemplary care for our students.

Congratulations on all you have achieved during your time at Siena, Mrs Thompson. We know you will be missed by the College community, but we wish you a happy and fulfilling retirement.



One of these titled, 'Snow at Siena 1952' has been reproduced on many occasions without any comment about the accuracy of the date. Fortunately, when we decided to double check our sources, we discovered that it actually snowed in Camberwell in 1951.
